

BRIEF HISTORY OF BARANGAY MAGLIMAN

Among the prominent and early settlers were Almario's, Manalo's, Pamintuan's and others. There were houses then when the barrio was just a budding settlement.

Later, when the boundaries of the adjoining towns were set, as surveys were initiated by the government, the area was divided into two became the barrio road and declared the boundary line between the towns of Bacolor. The houses occupying the eastern side of the road were identified as Magliman, Barrio San Juan, San Fernando in the 60's while those on the west Sitio Magliman, Barrio San Isidro Bacolor, Pampanga.

Agriculture was the primary industry in the community and almost all of the residents were farm hands. The chief crops were sugar cane and palay. People in the barrio were peaceful, hospitable and industrious. They had simple lives.

As time went by, more and more people settled in the place. Clearing on both sides of the road was improved yearly. Finances came from the two town's coffers. When the PASUDECO (PA-mpanga SU-gar DE-velopment CO-rporation) built its mills, and factories, the rails were constructed from the mill site to various places, passing through Magliman. This railroad track became the principal means of transportation of the residents in going to town proper. It was only after the last pacific war when a road was constructed linking to Magliman to National road.
